- Opiates include: morphine, codeine, methadone, oxycodone (Oxycontin, Percodan, Percocet), hydrocodone (Vicodin, Lortab, Norco), fentanyl (Duragesic, Fentora), hydromorphone (Dilaudid, Exalgo)
- Anyone can be at risk from people with a substance use disorder, people struggling with chronic pain, to young athletes with a sports injury
- Naloxone is a medication that is used for any suspected opiate overdose
- You can't use naloxone on yourself
- Anybody with a personal history of overdose is 29 times more likely to die of overdose in their lifetime
- Naloxone temporarily reverses opiate overdose for 30 to 90 minutes
- Naloxone is shown to reduce drug use in communities with harm reduction programs because of education
- Naloxone is only part of the treatment for overdose it is still important to make sure the person who overdosed gets to the hospital for medical treatment

Call 911

Always call 911 if you know of someone who is experiencing an overdose. A safer way to call 911 if someone is worried about the police showing up is to say someone is unresponsive or not breathing

 Michigan law protects people who use naloxone during an overdose from civil charges if any adverse outcome occurs because of the naloxone administered
