Services in the Right Place at the Right Time

MCN expanded its Children's Mobile Crisis program, receiving 96 urgent requests during the year with a 98% success rate in preventing the need for psychiatric hospitalization.

LOCAL CARE ADDRESSING LOCAL NEEDS

Across this country and in Michigan, we are seeing increased demand for mental health services. Services are inclusive and go far beyond traditional treatment in addressing underlying issues such as poverty, lack of housing, transportation needs, unemployment, and chronic health conditions—all of which can impact a person's mental health and wellbeing. Through this whole health approach to services, Montcalm Care Network is providing local care aimed at addressing local needs.

ADDRESSING THE SUBSTANCE USE CRISIS

Substance use disorders are at a crisis point nationally and Montcalm County is no exception. The rise of opioid use, legalization of marijuana, trafficking of methamphetamine, and stress from the pandemic has impacted everyone. In promoting better care and outcomes for our communities, Montcalm Care Network moved into action with three critical program offerings:

1 MCN launched an Integrated Dual Disorder Treatment team made up of social workers, nurses, and recovery coaches. The team provides for an integrated approach to addressing both the substance use and mental health needs of people in services, and promotes increased access by providing services in people's homes and other community settings.

2 MCN expanded its psychiatric services to provide Medication Assisted Treatment, which is the gold standard for helping people manage the cravings that accompany addiction, and is especially successful when paired with counseling services.

3 MCN embedded a Recovery Connections program in the county jail through a partnership with the Sheriff's Department. Substance use treatment starts in the jail and additional supports are provided upon release back into the community to reduce incidences of further legal involvement.

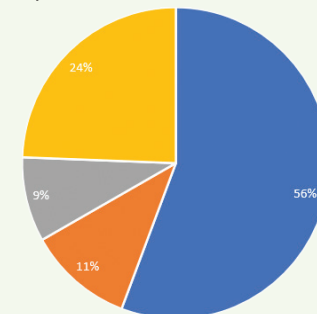
